January 2020 Bishop Laurie Skow-Anderson's Annual Report to the NWSWI

With the murder of her own people just days away, Queen Esther was called upon to do the unthinkable- petition the brutal King to save their lives. Her cousin Mordecai told her that she was brought into the palace and made Queen for just such a time as this. At great risk to her life she found the courage to act and saved her own people from certain death. Esther 3-4 1

We have experienced the transforming love and grace of Christ in our lives. We are called to act and do what we can as called baptized Lutheran Christians at just such a time as this. Nearly every day the media tells us of life sucking/death dealing situations in our communities, country, and world. We are called to act with compassion, love and courage. We aren't called to bury our heads in the sand or sit on our hands, rather "this is what the Lord requires of us," we are called to "Do justice, love kindness and walk humbly with our God. Micah 6:8. Do what you can. Make a difference.

For just such a time as this...today, how are you and your congregation called to do justice? Today, how can you show kindness? Today, can you walk humbly with God? Together I suggest that we:

- Listen to God-read the Bible and prayseek the truth-discern God's will-dwell in God's Word!
- Listen to others-engage in civil discourse about difficult topics-seek the common good
- Love God and love your neighbor, no exceptions, live the love

- Repent of our inaction or unjust actions and take action with courage to do the right thing
- Vote in 2020 elections, not as an act of partisan politics, but as a matter of faith

The five goals that we as Synod Ministers have been working on this past year are 1)Strengthen Congregational Vitality, 2)Equip for the Future, Connect with Malawi, 4)Grow Generosity and 5)Advocate For Justice. In the next year we will focus particularly on Advocating for

Justice. In response to God's call do "Do Justice," the Synod Justice Team was formed in July and has eight working groups:

- Creation Care
- Gun Violence
- Refugees/Global Migration
- Human Trafficking
 World Hunger
- Gender/Sexuality Equality
- 8. Get Out to Vote 2020

Synod Assembly 2020 Our synod assembly will be May 16, 2020 at Trinity Lutheran in Eau Claire. The theme is: Building a Bigger Table. The conversation at the assembly will be around justice issues and especially what it means to make a place at the God's Table for all people, no exceptions. Resolutions about racism, gender justice, care of creation, and others will be part of our assembly work. To strengthen our justice work, the synod council has called Deacon David Behling to serve as our Synod Advocate for Hunger and Justice on a volunteer basis. He can be a great resource in your congregation for adult forums or forming a justice team in your own congregation.

Can you imagine...

Of course you can. It's the one thing that those created late in the game on the sixth day are able to do while no other participant created previously is equipped for. We were made to imagine what might be and almost immediately God bid us to let our minds wander in order to consider what the Creator might be like, what the rest of creation might become known as, and how we might best steward what God has given us dominion and responsibility over.

Imagination is a powerful tool bound by no earthly thing. When we were children our imagination gave us inspiration and the courage to dare to peer into the future in order to envision what we might become one day. When we are no longer children our imagination can reach back through the years and render an image, aroma, or emotion of long ago. The power of imagination is God-like, allowing us to get as close as we can to creating something out of nothing, a characteristic of God who called forth all that exists from absolutely nothing.

Another characteristic of God is that He desires for us to imagine how we might love Him. According to the gospel writers, when Jesus was asked about what is most important to his Father he responds indicating we should, ...love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, and strength. Jesus then continues his response with an interesting addendum that's not included in the ancient passage from Deuteronomy that he quotes. He goes on to call us to love God with all of our *mind* as well - to think about how we might love God. And then, as if he can't help himself, Jesus ties love for God to love for others and names these two as being the most important to our God.

So...can you imagine? Can you imagine how your love of God might continue to be made known as a member of God's church and a faithful disciple of Jesus Christ? Can you imagine how your love for others, neighbor or stranger, might make itself known in the year to come as we begin our 127th year of ministry here at Osseo Evangelical Lutheran Church?

Come, let us imagine together what God is calling us to in 2020.

Report of the Church Council President

God's Blessings to each one of you. I am proud to be your Church President. On behalf of your Church Council, we thank all of you for your remarkable efforts for our Church. Your support, your trust, and your continued prayers for your Church Staff and your Church Council is greatly appreciated.

Thank you to the entire Church Staff for all their tireless work and efforts as they steer OELC in a positive and forward direction each day. God Bless you.

In no particular order, here is a summary of just a few of the many accomplishments achieved at Osseo Evangelical Lutheran Church in 2019:

- Achieved budget for 2019. The Church did not need to utilize our operating line of credit.
- Overcame our February 2019 Chapel/Sunday School Wing roof collapse. A newly constructed Chapel and Sunday School Wing is under construction and will be completed in January 2020.
- We are moving forward on a \$68,000.00 organ restoration project for the Church.
- Our call process is underway for a new Associate Pastor.
- The Flagship Worship Team began sharing their talents with us in 2019.
- We accomplished a record turnout for our 2019 Harvest Supper.
- 25 young members of our Church were confirmed on May 5th, 2019.
- 76 young members of our Church registered for Sunday School this year. This is an increase of 21% from a year ago.
- We welcomed 33 new members and 22 new baptized members to OELC in the fall of 2019.
- Stewardship breakfasts have been a wonderful success as it relates to attendance, fellowship, and the excellent food.
- Quarterly temple talks have been held to keep all members informed on many of the important topics and actions discussed and executed upon from the Church Staff and Church Council.
- We celebrated and added new Memorial Benches to our Church grounds for Pastor Lewis Thompson.
- A successful Church wide thrift sale was held in May.
- Another success ASP trip occurred in June of this year with 25 students and 11 adults making this mission trip.
- Designated a Historical Area of OELC in the Southwest corner of the Fellowship Hall.
- Molly's office improvements have been completed and her office has been moved to the Southeast entrance of the Church.
- The Church's garage/storage shed has been re-shingled.
- A new campfire area for our youth has been completed along with the planting of trees in memory of Henry and Gracia Anderson to the Westside lot of the Church.

God continues to shed his blessings upon us! Let our light continue to shine and serve others well.

- * Third grade Bibles were handed out in September.
- * Pizza with Pastor Terry was held in the Fellowship Hall with all of our Sunday School kids. This was an opportunity for the kids to ask Pastor Terry questions so they could get to know one another better!
- * Sunday School Christmas Program was held December 15th at the second service. "New Kid in Town" was the theme of our program this year.
- The 7th and 8th grade Confirmation students played the bell pipes during the offering. It was fantastic having so many grade levels lead our worship service that morning!
- * Our Sunday School kids headed up "God's Global Barnyard" in the months of November and December and raised just over \$800.00. With the support of our congregation and matching funds, our congregation contributed approximately \$3200.00.
- * First Communion classes are being offered for the 5th graders in January and will be receiving Holy Communion January 26th.
- * First Communion classes are also being offered for the 4th graders in March and they will receive Holy Communion March 29th.
- * Our Sunday School kids (and their families), will be taking turns hosting Coffee Hour starting the first week in February. This is a great opportunity for fun fellowship as well as helping to offset the cost of our Sunday School curriculum as the registration fee does not cover an entire year's worth of curriculum.

Endowment Fund Committee 2019 Report

In 2019, the Endowment Fund Committee began by welcoming newly elected three year term members Stuart Dodge and Jody Groell. The second order of business was to determine the amount of funds available for distribution, following the guidelines outlined in the Fund's Resolution, during the year and seek approval from the Council for the amount. Based on the Fund's performance in 2018, the committee recommended and received approval for distribution of up to \$35,000. The committee once again reached out to OELC High School Seniors who wished to apply for college scholarships in 2019. Four OELC youth were awarded scholarships based on their academic achievements, extracurricular activities and contributions to OELC. The funds also supported OELC youth attending Luther Park Bible Camp, Northwest Synod's High School youth God Stock Conference, previously awarded college scholarships for OELC youth, Northwest Synod Bold Generosity, and Northwest Synod's Luther Park's Building and Rejoicing Campaign.

An additional request came to the committee, following the initial approval of the distribution amount, to help with paying for the cost of the church's organ restoration. The requested amount from the Organ Restoration Committee was within the annual allowable percentage of the fund's assets for distribution, however it was more than the original amount approved. Therefore this additional requested amount required a recommendation from the Committee and once again approval from the OELC Council. The recommendation was made and approval was received to use the Fund to pay for the cost of the restoration.

2019 Stewardship & Finance Committee Report

The Stewardship/Finance Committee presented the proposed 2019 budget at the Congregation's Annual Meeting in January. The Missional Budget alternative was also included that shares with the congregation the three (3) areas that gifting will contribute to support the ministries and missions at OELC as well as our outside mission support in the coming year. The Missional Budget also shared some of the ministries and mission areas where



the congregations' gifts in 2018 were utilized. The committee's feels that this is a useful tool for members to see how OELC contributes to our missions, both locally and globally.

In 2019 the committee sponsored seven (7) fund raising breakfasts between services in an effort to raise monies to go to the General Fund. A total of \$2,352.02 was received through free will donations. Once again, Thrivent members at OELC graciously contributed funds through the Thrivent "Action Team" program to offset the cost of the food, supplies and drawing items for the breakfasts. The committee, along with the support and help of other OELC committees, will continue to sponsor breakfasts in 2020, with all donations received going to the General Fund and/or other OELC ministries.

The Committee prepared a draft 2020 budget for the Council to review and recommend to the congregation for approval at the January Annual Meeting. Once again, reductions in line items were made based on historical spending and increases in some line items were made to address requests from committees and/or mission areas.

Bless these needles that they stay strong and light so they don't tire the hands that wield them; Bless this yarn with strength and softness that it will form a shawl of warmth and comfort; Bless these hands with strength and skill so they may make well-crafted gifts; Bless this heart with strength and perseverance so we will see this work through to bring comfort to those in need; But most of all dear Lord, Bless the wearers of these shawls with strength and comfort that their burdens may be lightened and their hearts gladdened with the realization that they are loved. Amen"

This is the prayer that we pray when our group of 9 ladies assemble together monthly for our Prayer Shawl Ministry. Each of these individuals bring a love of their craft to this ministry and we are blessed to have them in our midst. We were thrilled in 2018 to have added a Prayer Shawl room, located just off the Fellowship Hall, and it continues to be a welcoming space to knit, crochet and share what God has blessed us with. We continue to gather on the first Wednesday of every month in the Prayer Shawl room from 1:00PM – 3:00PM. We have also added an additional Sunday gathering time between worship services, to allow those who are not able to attend during the week to join us for fellowship, prayer and stitching. That has currently been the 3rd Sunday of the month during the Fall to Spring months. We ALWAYS welcome ALL INTERESTED members to join us for either of these two monthly gatherings. This past year, several of our late Summer/early Fall meetings were held at the Osseo Nickel, where we could enjoy its peaceful outdoor and indoor spaces to assemble and stitch. Many thanks to Kurt Nelson for his offering of this time for us to gather.

As our Prayer Shawl Ministry continues to grow, we were blessed in 2019 to have wrapped 50 of our adult members, children and loved ones in these mantles of love, 14 of which were Baptismal shawls. We also continue to crochet cross bookmarks, which we present to our Confirmands annually in remembrance of their Baptism. Along with our popular Prayer Cloths, which are found in the Pray basket in the Narthex, we find our group constantly busy, doing what HE would want us to do.....being the hands and feet of our Lord.

OELC Prayer Shawl Ministry is part of a much larger Prayer Shawl Ministry that was started by several ladies from Connecticut in 1998. Little did they know, that what began as a simple prayer and act of kindness, would become a ministry that is now known worldwide. As a part of this Spirit filled ministry, we follow specific guidelines in our shawl creations. Using specific yarn types has allowed us to make shawls that are soft in nature, which is a general requirement. That being said, the use of some yarn that has been generously donated to us over the years, has been limited to our popular Prayer Cloths, a "cousin" to the prayer shawls. Because of the creative mind of Rosi Seffens, this year we were able to also utilize some of the yarn, not suitable for shawls, into decorative pumpkins. Those pumpkins were then donated to our WELCA bazaar, with the proceeds being used to support other functions and ministries in our church. A win, win for all!

Since our ministry began in 2011, the cost of yarn has increased significantly, with some of our favorite shawl yarns being completely discontinued. Our ministry is solely funded by generous monetary donations through memorials, our coffee hour sponsorship, THRIVANT CHOICE dollars and general giving from the heart. We are very frugal with our yarn purchases and are always watching for sales and using discounts whenever possible to make the best use of your kind and thoughtful monetary contributions. Tri County Food Pantry

Most of our food is purchased and we receive a delivery once a month from Feed My People Food Bank. Other food comes from food rescue. That means we pick up food at Kwik Trip (meat only), and Great Lakes Fresh Market. Both are very generous, and all food is free. We are also fortunate to get food left over after Ruby's pantry. So far this season we have picked up 700 pounds of venison from



Bushy's Meats in Independence. Grants have dried up and food rescue has become a bigger and bigger part of food pantries the last few years. It is great because it is free, but also heavy and time consuming, with little notice of when to pick up.

We depend on generous donations from individuals, churches, businesses, organizations and clubs for money to purchase needed food. The food pantry tries to have a standard list of items available at all times so families can plan their food budget.

Tri County Food Pantry always needs volunteers. We need volunteers the day of we are open to set up and put away tables, chairs and food, as well as with distribution. Help is also needed to meet the delivery truck, unload and stock shelves. Food rescue is a bigger part of food distribution and volunteers are needed to help pick up food at various locations and stock shelves. Help from our church members at Ruby's Pantry at the United Church of Christ Church would be greatly appreciated because we get a truck load of food at the end of the evening. It would be wonderful to have help loading and unloading this gift. We share this food from Ruby's with the Mondovi Food Pantry.

We are currently serving about 30 to 35 families in the Osseo area each month. Many of our families come only every other month. Some of our guests come once or twice to get over a "rough spot", others come for a longer period of time. Either way we are blessed to be able to help.

The food pantry has been a successful mission of Osseo Evangelical Lutheran Church since 1994. Thank you for your support of food, money and prayers.

2020 OELC Missional Budget

The tradition of providing an alternative to the line item budget for OELC members continues for 2020 with our fourth (4th) iteration of the Missional Budget. With the focus once again centered on OELC's mission statement, we have prepared examples of some of the highlights from 2019 in the mission and ministry areas that represent OELC. We have followed these accomplishment examples with those areas that will be emphasized or focused on by your church leadership in the coming year.

As always, your comments regarding this alternative budget proposal are greatly appreciated and welcomed.

Our Plan of Ministry

A) We share our faith and bring people to Jesus Christ

Approximately a total of 81 regular Sunday worship services were offered in 2019, this number does not include the services offered during the Easter and Christmas seasons. The Flagship Worship service, a contemporary form of worship, began with services on the fourth Sunday of the month originally, transitioning into the 10:45 service on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of each month beginning in September of this year. Baptisms in 2019 were 11 and 25 new members were welcomed into the OELC family. Our Sunday School enrollment saw a 20% increase over 2018. The Sunday school classes provided Special Music throughout the year with the pre-K through 3rd grade singing at the 8:15 service on the 2nd Sunday of each month and the 4th-6th grades singing at the 10:45 service on the 3rd Sunday of each month. Our Wednesday evening services for 2019, which included Advent, Lent and IGNITE services, were offered from September through May with a break over the summer months.

Leadership wishes to continue emphasizing these same areas along with **Evangelism** and **Gracious Stewardship** on 2020.

Budget Total - \$146,476.20

(This includes a percentage of the Pastor's salary; parsonage utilities, expenses, and insurance; the Parish Administrator and Assistant, Choir Director, organist, and janitors' salaries; janitorial supplies; telephone; copier; insurance, maintenance, and utilities.)

B) We love our neighbors as ourselves

In 2019 OELC continued its sponsorship of the free monthly community meal. In addition to assisting with Ruby's Pantry each month, our congregation is responsible for overseeing and running of the Tri-County Food Pantry on a monthly basis. Our Visiting Partner Ministry continues to reach out to OELC members unable to attend regular services and our Prayer Shawl Ministry provides shawls to individuals in times of comfort and celebration. The last Sunday of each month provides an opportunity for children and families to bring loose change for the Noisy Offering that goes to OELC ministry/mission areas as well as local area needs. Our high school and middle school programs participated in the Sleep in Heavenly Peace through construction of beds for families in need and they sponsored a campaign to collect needed bedding items too. Senior High youth spent a week participating in the Appalachian Service Project (ASP) once again.

Two high school youth from OELC, for the second year, served on the Northwest Synod Youth Board. And four students attended the Godstock High School Synod Youth Gathering in Eau Claire.

It is our plan to continue emphasizing these same areas in 2020, along with the previously mentioned area of Evangelism.

Budget Total - \$162,651.18

(This includes a percentage of the Pastor's salary; parsonage utilities, parsonage 1 maintenance needs, expenses, and insurance; the Parish Administrator and Assistant, Choir Director, organist, and janitors' salaries, and telephone, copier, insurance, maintenance, and utilities.)

C) We minister to the needs of ALL people

In 2019 OELC continued its commitment to Osseo and the surrounding area with involvement in, or the sponsoring of, Tri-County Food Pantry, Ruby's Pantry and the previously mentioned free monthly Wednesday night meal. Our members responded to the needs youth in the local and surrounding area by participating in Sleep in Heavenly Peace program. Through the generosity of OELC members, we contributed to Sunday School's sponsorship of God's Global Barnyard in 2019, providing needed funds for livestock to ELCA sponsored countries. The

previously identified Noisy Offering also contributed to Osseo-Fairchild School District's weekend backpack meals program.

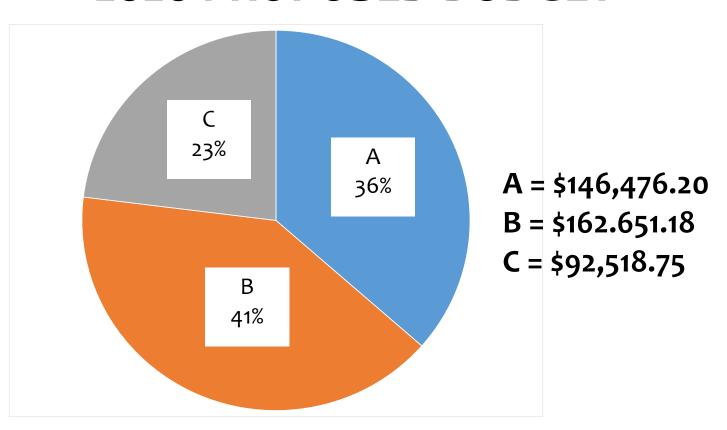
Once again, the gifted hands of OELC quilters led to quilts being given to Lutheran World Relief, Trempealeau County Health Care Center, homeless families, fire victims, and OELC members in Assisted Living/Nursing care facilities in the Osseo and surrounding area. We continued our support to the Ministerial Alliance, conducting worship services at Dove Health Care and Pigeon Falls Health Care Center, Chaplin services for Northern Trempealeau County, Christmas stockings for Tri-County Food Pantry, school supplies to local area schools and hospital visits to Mayo Health Care/Osseo on an as needed basis to serve the whole community when called upon.

The year 2020 will continue these ministries and address the increased need to once again grow our partnership with our Malawi sister congregation and the Northwest Synod Mission areas.

Beyond the Wall: Making All Things New



hen have you discovered newness in life through Christ? Did you have to step out in faith to do so? Perhaps you had to let go of your will and accept God's will. This

is a major turning point in the faith journey of many people. There are examples in Scripture about Job (Job 29-30), Elijah (I Kings 19:4-14), Mary Magdalene (Luke 8:1-2) and the women at the tomb (Luke 23:55 – 24:5). Consider the story of the rich young man (Matthew 19:16-26, Mark 10:17-31, Luke 18:18-30). He approached Jesus with a simple question: "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus replied, "Go, sell what you own, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven." When the young man heard this, he was very sad and walked away, because he was very rich. Given the choice, he found it difficult to forsake wealth in this world for the promise of God and eternal life.

Sometimes there are barriers or walls that complicate trying something new or stepping out in faith. What walls or barriers have you encountered? Consider the story of Zacchaeus (Luke 19:1-10), who wanted to witness Jesus preaching but was too short to see past the crowd. After Zacchaeus climbed a tree, Jesus called out to him and invited himself to lunch in Zacchaeus' home. We know what Jesus said to Zacchaeus.

and he was a different person afterward. He had changed from wanting wealth and success in this world to desiring significance through a life of faith. When have you, or your congregation, chosen success over significance? Perhaps when using numbers or the size of your facilities as a measure. Moving toward significance usually means sacrificing success. In what areas of ministry is your congregation seeking significance today?

Stepping out in faith may be a personal choice for a short time but usually involves accompanying others. As members in the body of Christ, we are not called to meet our own needs alone. The Great Commission (Matthew 28:16-20) calls us to go beyond our barriers and bring the message of Jesus Christ to others. This helps us grow beyond a Christian enclave to become servants of Christ and a serving community. In what ways has your congregation moved from an enclave to a servant community?

Overcoming barriers and walls to make things new involves stepping out in faith. It means shaking loose from lethargy and moving out from sheltered comfort. In the process we break the chains of sin that hold us back and divide us from making us one in Christ. When we share in the distress of God's heart to do the kingdom's work, we are in tune with God's will, choosing significance over success and becoming a servant community. This is when we feel the vitality of our faith and the power of the Holy Spirit. May you experience this newness in Christ in and through your ministry.
