

ZechariahThe Quietest of the Advent Voices

Surely you remember good ol' Zechariah from the Bible, don't you? If not, let me try to narrow it down a bit. Do you remember the good ol' Zechariah who we meet in the first chapter of Luke's gospel? He is the last entry under said

him, perhaps even forgotten who he was. You see he was married to lady named Elizabeth for a good long time and, while their many years together were blessed in a great many ways, the two of them had seemingly been overlooked in one significant way – they had had no child.

In addition, Zechariah, who was a temple priest in Jerusalem, seldom had the opportunity to perform what must have been one of the most desirable parts of his work. He was one of thousands of temple priests who waited patiently for their bi-annual one-week rotation in the temple. More specifically within his two weeks of temple service each year Zechariah no doubt waited with great hope for the chance to enter into the inner sanctum to tend to the incense altar in order that prayers might be lifted up to God Almighty. He had been passed over by the casting of lots a great many times and was an old man when his name was finally chosen.

What a day in the life of Zechariah, finally it would be he and God alone in the heart of the temple - except it wasn't just he and God alone. If you are remembering the story now you'll remember that an angel of the Lord named Gabriel was present as well. It turns out, according to Gabriel, that God had not overlooked Zechariah & Elizabeth but, rather, had chosen them to bear a son who would announce and prepare the way for the arrival the long-awaited Messiah, the birth of our Savior Jesus Christ.

Somewhat startled, I imagine, Zechariah poses a seemingly fair question: 'How will I know that this is so?' and it gets him even more attention from God, albeit the wrong kind of attention. Gabriel rationalizes in response to Zechariah's question, "because you did not believe my words... you will become mute, unable to speak". And thus, the Zechariah of many biblical Zechariahs, the New Testament temple priest who has an up-close encounter with the angel of the Lord, and the first witness to the dawning age of the coming of the long-awaited Messiah becomes the quietest of all the Advent voices.

You may remember the occasion when Zechariah is finally allowed to speak again, it's nine plus months after his encounter with Gabriel the angel. Elizabeth has given birth to a son and on the eighth day of his life he is to be named and marked outwardly as a child of God's. The naming becomes the stumbling block on that long-ago day. There is no discussion about the boy being marked outwardly in circumcision but there is plenty of discussion as to what his name will be. Finally, it is Zechariah who declares in writing (all caps I always imagine) **THE BOY'S NAME SHALL BE JOHN**.

The gospel writer Luke records that giving the child the name John, or Zechariah getting his voice back, or him praising God with great passion caused quite a ruckus that day. It elicited fear that came out in the form of a collective question, "What then will this child become?".

The answer to that question comes in the last 14 verses of Luke, chapter one. You should read it as a reminder this Advent season. It is a powerful and important prophesy from the quietest of all the Advent voices announcing the coming of the Savior of the world. It is also a birth announcement for

Please DO NOT let financial concerns keep youth from signing up—we will do fundraisers and have scholarship moneys available as needed. Adult crew leaders/chaperones needed!

December 12th at 6:00 in the Youth Room.
Those attending are asked to bring a wrapped gift (\$10 range) to include in a gift exchange game. We'll also have food and Christmas music. Any adults willing to help plan and host, please contact me.

Another quick but sincere "thank you" to all who helped at the Harvest Supper! The enthusiasm and hard work of the youth set the tone for all involved that day.

Congrats to all who were part of the recent choir and band concerts! It's great to see and hear the talent of the young people in our congregation and our community, and I look forward to future concerts. Best of luck to those getting ready for winter sports; have a fun and safe season!

Christmas Message to the Northwest Synod of Wisconsin

Psalm 137:4 How can we sing the Lord's song in a foreign land?

In 1926, my maternal grandmother left Germany and immigrated to the United States. One of my earliest memories is singing Silent Night (Stille Nacht) in German by the Christmas tree in her small house in Jackson, MN. I wonder what it was like for her to move to a foreign land not speaking the language. I wonder how difficult it must have been for her to sing her song in a foreign land.

Last Christmas most of us couldn't gather inside our church buildings to sing Silent Night on Christmas Eve. Some of us sang to our computer screens, some sang in their cars in the parking lot, some sang with masks. We were all trying to sing the Lord's song in a foreign land, the land of COVID. It has been difficult. Our song has been muted.

Psalm 137 is a lament Psalm. The writer of Psalm 137 is describing the pain of the people who were forced to live in a foreign land after witnessing the destruction of their homeland and their temple. They are grieving the losses, lamenting, crying, and finding it impossible to "sing the Lord's song in a foreign land."

My heart goes out to the Afghan Refugees who are experiencing their first winter at Fort McCoy. I wonder how difficult it will be for them to sing their songs of faith in a foreign land. Many know that they will never go home again.

In Luke 1 Mary sings her song in unknown territory. She has received the message from Gabriel that she will bear God's son and his name is to be Jesus, and he will reign as king forever. This incomprehensible message is confirmed by her relative Elizabeth and changes Mary's life's circumstances. Mary is asked to do what no one has ever done before. This is uncharted and foreign territory for a young girl. She sings her song in a foreign land like her sisters before her Miriam, Ruth, and Hannah. She sings a song of courage, faith, hope, and love.

This Advent/Christmas/Epiphany season I invite you to reflect on Mary's song as an old song sung in new circumstances. Many of us and our churches find ourselves dealing with circumstances we might not have chosen for ourselves and wish were different, circumstances that might cause us to lament and grieve. We are here now. Sing. Join Mary and the faithful of every time and place, that great cloud of witnesses, and sing of courage, faith, hope, and love. Sing. Sing an old song of trust in unfamiliar territory, and sing a new song of hope in a new land. We are here now.

May the Hope of Advent, Joy of Christmas and Light of Epiphany bring you Peace.

Of these roles, serving on the Council is perhaps the most "time-intensive," and yet even these leaders serve only a few hours each month: one 60–120-minute meeting, the 2nd Wednesday of each month, after 30-60 minutes of meeting preparation and review, plus serving on various work groups or committees, for another 30-60 minutes each month. A total commitment of less than five hours each month, and yet together, these leaders can support the works of countless volunteers and staff, all throughout our congregation.

We hope you'll hear this call and be moved to reach out. Preparations are being finalized this month for the upcoming election and activities for the annual meeting at the end of January. Are you ready to say "YES!"? Contact any member of the Nominating Committee: Brent McCune, Patty Hoffman, Linda Heiman, Vern Larson, or Shannon Hasz. They'd all be happy to answer questions or share their experiences. Don't delay any longer, your moment is now!

SPONSORSHIPS

Year End Giving

Many people evaluate their charitable giving for the calendar year in December. There are significant provisions in the CARES Act that have been extended through the end of 2021. Here are some charitable giving basics to keep in mind for 2021 (tax returns filed in 2022).

- Non-itemizers \$300 tax deduction: Individuals taking the standard deduction can claim an additional deduction of up to \$300 for cash contributions directly to operating charities, while married couples filing jointly can claim up to \$600.
- Itemizers benefit, too: For those who do itemize their deductions, cash contributions to qualified charities, such as OELC, can be deducted up to 100% of your Adjusted Gross Income for the 2021 calendar year. Deduction amounts above this limit may be carried over for up to five tax years.
- Give appreciated non-cash assets instead of cash: Donors who use this strategy can generally eliminate the capital gains tax they would otherwise incur if they sold the assets first and then donated the proceeds.
- RMD still a great way to donate: Retirees with traditional IRA accounts must take required minimum distributions after age 72. Some individuals may find themselves in the unfortunate position of being in a higher tax bracket after satisfying their RMD requirement.
- Those who don't need their RMD distribution to fund their lifestyle can consider applying the qualified charitable deduction or charitable rollover strategy, after age 701/2. QCDs allow you to roll your RMD directly over to a qualified charity (up to \$100,000 each year) and reduce your taxable income by excluding the amount gifted. QCD requests generally should be initiated by early December at the latest to ensure processing is complete before the end of the year.
