He Appears Every Holy Week Eliciting Mixed Feelings at Best

This year we'll first hear from him on Good Friday when, according to John's gospel Jesus, who has already been roughed up by the Romans, taken for a consultation with Annas the high priest emeritus, denied by Peter, questioned by the reining high priest Caiaphas, denied by Peter a couple more times, and then at long last, when it was well into the wee hours of the night, will be taken to appear before Pontius Pilate – some have called it a trial, but that's a stretch.

One gets the feeling right away that Pilate, governor of Judea at that time, would have just as soon remained asleep in his bed next to his dreaming wife and oblivious to the story that was unfolding around him. But, for better or worse, it was not to be so.

After having been dragged from his bed into the middle of an already disrupted hornet's nest he can see no reason why the man they call King of the Jews, brought to him in the dark of the night, should die or be punished at all. What Pontius Pilate did find

punished at all. What Po

was evidence that this man's problems were destined to become his problems if he was not very careful.

This is where the

mixed feelings I alluded to earlier begin to make themselves known. Pilate's poignant question gives away his own mixed feelings regarding Jesus Christ when he asks, "What is truth?" The truth, as he has discovered, can be whichever side of the story serves your needs best.

The opposing stories in this particular conflict have Pilate trapped between the proverbial rock and a hard place. If he has Jesus put to death, the locals will surely make a heroic martyr of him. If he sets Jesus free and there is trouble in Judea the Romans will want to know why.

In the end, amidst the agony of finding no crime yet knowing there is no way to avoid punishment I so wish that Pilate had found something else to do with his hands than to simply publicly and politicly wash them for all to see.

I wish he would have raised just one hand, if not to save a life, then to bring a merciful end to the beating, whipping, and public humiliation. I wish Pilate could have shaken Jesus' hand or placed his hand on his shoulder and shared a few words of regret and comfort for what was to come.

To this day, when we confess our faith in what Jesus accomplished in his life, death, and resurrection we also confess what Pilate

didn't do with his hands while he had the chance.

According to the Family Support Center (FSC) based in Chippewa Falls, January was both Stalking Awareness Month and Human Trafficking Awareness Month, February was Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month, and April is Sexual Assault Awareness Month. Here's some information to think about: Safe Horizon, a national non-profit victim services agency (www.safehorizons.org) estimates that

each year in the US 7.5 million people (other sources say more than 13 million), both men and women, are victims of stalking; often, but not always, by someone they know like a current or former romantic partner. One in 7 victims relocate as a result of the stalking. Stalking is defined as a "course of conduct," meaning two or more acts, that causes emotional distress or fear of bodily harm. Some behaviors that are signs of stalking include:

- unwanted phone calls to home or work.
- signs someone has been in or near the victim's home, car, or workplace while she/he wasn't there.
- recording, monitoring, or photographing the victim's activities.
- repeated contact (letters, e-mail, gifts, etc.) despite being told to stop.
- attempts to get information about the victim from a third party.
- sharing information and/or rumors on social media or via word of mouth.

By Wisconsin law, stalking does not require a threat by the offender, only that the conduct is intended to or has caused fear to the victim or would be likely to cause fear to any reasonable person. Wisconsin's statutes classify stalking as a Class I [as in India] felony, with greater penalties under certain circumstances.

Worldwide almost 25 million people are considered victims of "forced labor" (including forced sexual exploitation), or "human trafficking." Data in Wisconsin are hard to quantify due to inconsistencies in legal definition of terms and data reporting practices. According to a report from the Wisconsin Department of Children and Families, during the 15-month period of June 1, 2017, through August 31, 2018, there were 99 substantiated allegations of child (under 18) sex trafficking in the state, involving 86 unique victims (meaning 13 were involved in multiple allegations). The interstate highway system in Wisconsin and Minnesota makes those states a common corridor for human trafficking of all sorts.

A 2019 nationwide report from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) reported 1 in 12 high school students who had been dating in the prior 12 months had experienced physical and/or sexual dating violence. According to Dare2Know Wisconsin, in this state that number is 1 in 5, with 2/3 of teens in abusive relationships not telling anyone about the abuse.

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services reported that in 2012, 1.2 million Wisconsin adults said they'd experienced sexual assault in their lifetime, roughly 20% of the state's 2010 census population of 5.8 million. About one out of three women and almost one out of five men reported being victims, and again, 50% identified a current of former romantic partner as the offender.

In virtually all cases, people of color and members of the LGBTQIA+ community had significantly higher rates of victimization than Whites, and in all cases, under-reporting, and the issues like how to legally define certain terms suggest the numbers are actually much higher.

No one likes to talk or even think about these issues, but talking is exactly what needs to happen. Awareness and education are keys to battling the devastation caused by these misdeeds. FSC has information available on each of these topics, along with parenting support, on its website: familysupportcenter.webs.com. Speaking for myself, I'm not any sort of expert, but I'm not afraid to talk one-on-one with anyone, especially youth, about these or any other topic regarding human sexuality. You cannot embarrass me by engaging me in a discussion about sex. Everything is, of course, confidential unless covered by the "mandatory reporting" laws (I have to report any suspicions of abuse or neglect, any talk of suicidal thoughts/plans, and any talk of thoughts/plans of harming self or others).



Easter Message from Bishop Laurie Skow-Anderson ~ April 2023

Matthew 28 After the Sabbath, as the first day of the week was dawning, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to see the tomb. And suddenly there was a great earthquake, for an angel of the Lord, descending from heaven, came and rolled back the stone and sat on it... the angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus who was crucified. He is not here, for he has been raised, as he said... go quickly and tell his disciples."

Dear Northwest Synod of Wisconsin,

Join me and that great cloud of witnesses this Easter in the acclamation:

Christ is Risen.

He is Risen indeed, Alleluia!

The gospel reading for this Easter is from the book of Matthew. Matthew is the only gospel writer that records an **earthquake** on Easter morning. The women arrive at the tomb and are greeted by an earthquake, an angel rolling back the stone, and the news that their Lord and Savior wasn't there, JESUS HAD BEEN RAISED FROM THE DEAD. What? The women were filled with shock and fear. The

aftershocks of this earthquake are still felt. The news that death doesn't win and is defeated by the power of God in Christ Jesus continues to shock and amaze us.

What if we imagined Easter not as a lovely spring ritual filled with pastel-colored eggs and candy but as the violent earthquake that it is? Few living in the Midwest have experienced an earthquake. A pastor born in California remembers her mother putting rubber bands on the kitchen cupboard handles so the china dishes wouldn't fall out when there was an earthquake. When has a death of a loved one shaken the foundation of your world? When have you realized how fragile life can be? Christ's resurrection from the dead, his victory over sin, death, and the devil shakes up everything. It is the good news that can even shake us loose from our grief.

What if we experienced Easter as a violent earthquake more like a fresh egg dropped to the floor than one hard-boiled and beautifully decorated? What if the Easter Earthquake shakes us awake, shakes everything out of the cupboards and closets so we are forced to do spring cleaning and decide what to put back and what to throw out? What if we get rid of stuff that doesn't work and give more space to what's important? What is really important? What is God's will for you? What are our Easter priorities?

What if this year the Easter Earthquake cracks open and rolls away the stone from our hearts, shakes loose old ideas, breaks down rock-hard prejudices, and opens us up to new ways to love our neighbor and to share this amazing good news that Jesus lives? What new life might rise up from the rubble? What new relationships might develop? Like a chick struggles to break free of the egg's shell, new beginnings are rarely easy, but they are worth it.

The good news is that Christ's resurrection from the dead and his victory over death is good news even to those who have experienced a literal shifting of tectonic plates beneath the earth. On February 6, 2023, a 7.8 magnitude earthquake hit Turkey and Syria leaving over 50,000 people dead and hundreds of thousands more wounded, displaced, or homeless. More than 10,000 aftershocks have been felt since February 6 leading to more deaths, fear, and trauma. The aftershocks will continue for a long time.¹

This Easter, in response to the earthquake that opened the tomb and to the good news that Jesus has been raised from the dead, I encourage you to give a gift to the Lutheran Disaster Response to help the victims of the Earthquake in Turkey and Syria. Here is a link to help you do that.
