



The following was written before Mrs. Carter's death on November 19th.

I've shared in the past my admiration of former president Jimmy Carter and his lifetime of humanitarian work in response to his faith in the Gospel. But he hasn't been alone on the journey. In 1946, Mr. Carter, a cadet at the US Naval Academy, married 19-year-old Eleanor Rosalynn Smith, a friend and neighbor from Plains, GA. After her father died when she was 13, as the oldest of her siblings, Rosalynn had been helping her mother support the family and care for the other children.

Jimmy's Navy career kept them moving, and they had three sons born in three different US states. When Jimmy left the armed forces in 1953, they moved back to Georgia, where Rosalynn helped manage his family's multiple business ventures. Their final child, Amy, was born in Georgia in 1967.

When Jimmy entered politics, winning a Georgia Senate seat in 1962, Rosalynn was a tireless supporter and part of the campaign management team. She helped him in a successful run for Governor of Georgia in 1970, then in his campaign for the White House in 1976. She often traveled the country apart from him as an ambassador of his campaign message, using her quiet and friendly manner to win support for her husband. As First Lady of the US, she attended Cabinet meetings, represented the President at official occasions, and was his personal envoy to Latin America.

She had a love for the performing arts, inviting to the White House many artists from the US and around the globe, and helped focus attention on the arts in this country. But probably her biggest legacy will be her work with mental health. As First Lady she spoke before a Senate subcommittee on mental health in 1979, and after the couple left Washington and founded the Carter Center in 1982, Rosalynn created the Carter Center Mental Health Program. The goal has been to raise awareness of mental health issues, and to eliminate the stigma and discrimination associated with mental health and diseases of the brain.

Part of her vision was to see mental health covered by insurance companies at the same level as physical health issues. In 1996, the Mental Health Parity Act (MHPA) became federal law, which, while a small step, began a move toward that vision. The MHPA led the way to 2008's Paul Wellstone and Pete Domenici Mental Health Parity and Addiction Equity (MHPAE) Act, which extended the original language to include substance abuse disorders. In July of 2023, the US Departments of Labor and Health and Human Services proposed another update that, besides strengthening the guidelines of the 2008 Act, would specify that eating disorders and autism care are considered mental health issues that should be covered. That proposal is still in the works.

According to the National Institute of Mental Health, part of the government's National Institute of Health (NIH), more than 57 million American adults live with some form of mental illness, with over 14 million dealing with what's termed a Significant Mental Illness. The most recent update from The Carter Center notes that parity between mental illness health care and physical health care is far from being achieved. But the Center is working with a list of newsrooms like the Los Angeles Times, the Chicago Tribune, and Texas Public Radio to produce stories spreading the word about mental health, care, access, and parity. What improvement in mental health care the country has seen in the last 50 years or will see someday wouldn't be possible without the groundwork done by Mrs. Carter's high-profile advocacy.

Mary the Brave: Mary the God Bearer

As a young pastor and working mom, I struggled with the challenges of balancing work and home life, often

while carrying a child in my womb, arms, on my hip, in a front or back baby pack, or car seat. Now my children are adults, and I have the joy of watching them carry my grandchildren. They do it differently than I did, their car seats are much nicer than the ones we had, but like us, they carry their children with much love. I still carry my adult children and grandchildren and will always carry them, in my heart with much love. This Advent and Christmas season I'm reflecting on Mary, the God bearer. (In Greek it's Theotokos².) Mary carried Jesus. Like all parents she carried her child with love, but she is also the God bearer. It was a brave thing Mary did to bear God into the world.

To love is a brave thing. It is a brave thing to become a parent. Mothers put their own lives at risk bearing a child in their womb and giving birth. It requires a measure of bravery for parents to bring a child into this world filled with the bad news of climate disasters, gun violence, war, political upheaval, racism, food/water insecurity, and escalating health and higher education costs.

Luke 1: 26ff In the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin engaged to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. The virgin's name was Mary. And he came to her and said, "Greetings, favored one! The Lord is with you... "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. And now, vou will conceive in vour womb and bear a son, and you will name him Jesus. He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High, the child to be born will be holy; he will be called Son of God... For nothing will be impossible with God." Then Mary said, "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word." Then the angel departed from her.

History has painted Mary to be quiet, meek and mild, submissive to God's will, but a closer read shows us that Mary was brave. Mary was neither meek nor superhuman.³ She had grit. She was faithful, courageous, strong and brave. Most of all, she was human. Her encounter with the angel Gabriel, the messenger of God made her brave. She knew that her pregnancy was dangerous and she could die giving birth. She also knew that as an unmarried teenaged mother it would cause upheaval in her family and community. She would give birth to Jesus during Roman occupation, a time of political unrest. Mary was *brave*. Her encounter with the living God made her brave

Her encounter with God gave her bravery and the faith to see that if God was calling her God would also protect her. It revealed to her that God chooses the people on the margins, those overlooked and underestimated. Bearing God in the world was to bring good news and hope to those oppressed. May Mary, the God Bearer, inspire us all to be brave!

This Advent and Christmas season, I invite you to be Theotokos, God Bearers. I invite you to carry the good news of Christ's birth, life, death and resurrection to all those we meet on this journey of life and the love of Jesus in your hearts always.



What is Realm? Realm is a real ministry tool.

Realm is a secure online ministry tool designed for real time connection. It helps our church connect with you and you connect with us. Realm allows you to manage your personal information and who is allowed to see it, control your giving, and keep in touch with the groups/ministries/teams that you are part of.

Why is Molly asking me to join Realm & schedule myself?

Volunteer Scheduling Tools – Create and communicate volunteer schedules: Realm church volunteer scheduling software provides staff with each member's serving preferences and scheduling conflicts to make the headache of creating schedules easy. And when life happens, volunteers can even request to find replacements to serve.

<u>Church Volunteer Management Tools – Give time back to staff</u>: Managing volunteers can be a time-consuming role for staff. Realm allows volunteers to assign themselves, at the times they prefer, mark when they can't serve, and communicate with other volunteers.

Who can view my information on Realm?

Realm is a private, password protected database system for members of our church only. YOU can choose your privacy settings to any of the following: "anyone in OELC", "leaders & team members", "leaders", "users with permission only" (this indicates OELC's staff only), and finally, "custom privacy" (choose different privacy levels for specific contact fields and personal information. Note that this information is always visible to users with permission to view profiles (staff).

Should my adult children remain in my household?

This is a great moment to encourage your adult children to create their own profile in Realm so that they can remain connected with us in their adult life.

Northwest Synod of Wisconsin (NWSWI) of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America is writing this letter to invite you to participate in the upcoming election of our synod Bishop at Synod Assembly 2024. All congregations have three responsibilities:

- 1. Each congregation should send the appropriate number of lay representatives and rostered leader representatives if available to vote at the Dairyland Conference Assembly on Thursday, February 8 at 7PM at Faith Lutheran Church, Durand.
- 2. The wide distribution of information regarding the nominees, once all individuals have been contacted, and confirmed their interest or have recused themselves, is key. Discussion, townhall style meetings, participation by all members is encouraged during the Q&A sessions and sharing of the biographic videos should be shown or taken to those who cannot watch it themselves. Healthy participation is key in any election, and non-voting observers are welcome at all gatherings.

3. Each congregation should send an appropriate number of lay representatives and rostered leader representatives if available to vote at the NWSWI Synod Assembly on June 7-8, 2024, in Eau Claire, WI to elect a Bishop from those individuals nominated and confirmed. Additional nominees can be made at Synod Assembly per open Ecclesiastical ballot guidelines.

The process for the nomination of a Bishop was changed at our last Synod Assembly and details will follow from your Conference Dean, Pastor Bethany Walker frclcpastor@gmail.com or 715-672-8107. Details and a full timeline is available on the website: https://nwswi.org/synod-assembly-2024.

We look forward to navigating this process together, guided by the Spirit, in the work of the Kingdom of Heaven. With deep gratefulness, we thank you for your prayerful participation.
